The Spanish Golf Federation is very pleased to welcome all the participants, captains and officials to the European Ladies' Amateur Team Championship 2010!

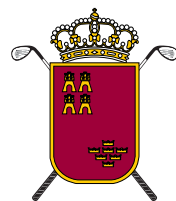

Europe's top ladies golf at La Manga

La Manga Golf resort in Murcia, will host the 28th edition of the Ladies' European Team Championship, one of the main events on the European schedule, which attracts the leading players of the participating countries, eager to defend their homeland colours.

Along its 27 editions, many top LET and even LPGA Tour players, have represented their countries as amateurs, thus highlighting the significance of the event.

The players and the host country are fully aware of the importance of this team competition, one of the benchmarks of the interna-

tional amateur calendar.

Europe's golf leading countries – from England, the eight times winner, to powerful Sweden or Spain, the ambitious host – as well as Austria, Belgium, Denmark, Finland, France, Germany, Iceland, Ireland, Italy, the Netherlands, Norway, Scotland, Switzerland, and Wales, will all compete for the much coveted title.

Moreover, the tournament will be a further step towards the confirmation of women's golf as a major international sports show. Events such as these are at the root of the consistent growth of women's professional golf, both in quantity and quality.



La Manga, the perfect venue

The first week of July La Manga Club will provide an attractive setting for the players. This particular area of the eastern coast boasts a microclimate with a pleasant breeze, particularly welcome in the hot Spanish summer.

The South Course will be in top condition. La Manga Club maintenance team has been working up to the smallest detail to ensure that the course will live up to the expectations. In short, five exciting and enjoyable days of competitive summer golf, on outstanding facilities, lie ahead of the top-class players that are already amongst us.





La Manga Club

La Manga Club is located in a unique setting amid the rolling hills that separate the crystalline Mediterranean from the warm waters of the Mar Menor Sea in Murcia, southern Spain. Lying to the south of the Costa Blanca, this region is known as the Costa Cálida, or ‘warm coast’, thanks to its mild, year-round Mediterranean climate.

THE SOUTH COURSE

Originally designed by Robert Putman in 1971 and subsequently remodeled in 1992 by Arnold Palmer, La Manga Club’s South Course was completely refurbished in 2004.

The Championship course at La Manga Club, the South, is probably one of the fairest tests of golf one can find. At 6,499 meters from the White Tees - 5,739 from the Blue Marks-, whilst being accepted as a top-calibre

championship course, also provides a thorough test both for the scratch player and right across the handicap range.

Located in the centre of the valley, with wide palm-fringed fairways and water hazards that come into play on 15 of the 18 holes, the South Course holds few hidden dangers.

The many strategically positioned water hazards and bunkers will certainly punish any wayward shots. The front nine are particularly tough, with two par 3’s over 200 meters and some daunting par 4’s which will demand accurate driving between lakes and bunkers, requiring long irons or fairway woods to the green. The back nine, although shorter, has a number of intriguing dog-leg holes. Special attention should be given to both the 11th and 12th holes, which demand precise club selection to

greens across water. The large waste area on 14 will provide “food for thought” for most players, and is followed by the par 4, 15th, which fully justifies its stroke 1 rating. The new stream bordering the 16th Green, now feeds a newly constructed lake protecting the front of the green, which for sure will require 100% concentration from all golfers. The par 5, 18th, with water on both sides of the fairway and a ravine just short of a well-protected green, will prove to be a particularly stern finish.

The South Course has been the venue for many major professional tournaments; Spanish Open (both ladies’ and men’s), PGA Championships and Qualifying Schools for both the men’s and ladies’ European Tours. In addition, it remains the firm favourite of many companies throughout the world as the perfect venue for their corporate events.

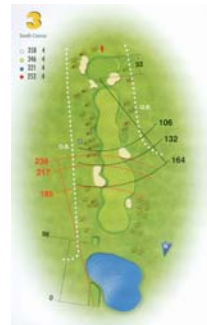
The South Course



1st hole (Par 4. 349 metres)
A long par 4. With the danger on the right (water hazard) and bunker to the left: remember taking a driver with a little “accidentle” cut means deeper into the water. The safe play is 3w off the tee the shot to the green, “if you don’t have hcp” when the pin is to the right is all carry so take plenty of club. Play it as a 3 shot green if you have a hcp on the hole.



2nd hole (Par 3. 147 metres)
A long par 3. Water again to the right. Very often the wind come’s off the left at the end of the houses. You can always see or feel that. So aim down the left side to the bunker. Remember a splash shot out of the bunker to the pin is better than a splash into the water off the tee.



3rd hole (Par 4. 321 metres)
Straight up par 4. The bunker on left is very often in play. The bunker on right mostly isn’t. That’s your line of play. Comming into the green from the right side of fairway, is a good line. Longer hitters should have no problem with going over the bunker up the left side.



4th hole (Par 5. 421 metres)
Great par 5. If you play it the right way, it is a tough one to get up in 2. Tee shot has O.B. (out of bounds) on the right and left . So 3wd to right side of fairway should keep you short of bunker and out of someone’s gardin. 2nd shot, take aim at the bunker on left with a mid iron that way you avoid water hazard on right and leave yourself an excellent line in for any pin position. 3rd shot once again its all carry over the water choose your club and strike the ball (the water isn’t there).



5th hole (Par 3. 154 metres)
Par 3 with the back drop of the Mar Menor in the distance, this is a lovely hole. But it is O.B. on the left and water and bunker to the right. Look out. For signs of any breeze, it can be stronger near the green. Club selection is important, there is plenty of room to chip back if yours is long and right. Anything left and you could be 3 off the tee.



6th hole (Par 5. 476 metres)

Another great Par 5. Yes, it is long so it has a 3 shot green but 4 if you have hcp. You can cut the corner to left but the best play is centre and right side, 3rd again will mean for most players that you won't reach the bunker in 2nd shot.

Take a club that you know that can't reach the bunker on left side, then hit it as soft as you like.

Not only that keep you away from the water on right side, the left one is a good angle to come in from 3rd shot. Do your maths, you should be around 110-130 mts from front of green, so add that extra club (yes, because it's all carried with the 2 bunkers at front, coming into play). From here, there is a nice walk down to the 7th, so you can collect your thoughts on your game plan. Passing the Half-way House, it will be a good idea to stop and have soft drinks and snacks.



7th hole (Par 4. 326 metres)

Par 4. Not a long hole but a tight tee shot. A good choice of club will put you in good position for your 2nd shot. It's a very wide green but not very deep.



8th hole (Par 4. 312 metres)

Par 4. Good hole for the driver, wide fairway with plenty of space on the right. 2nd shot may look short but taking plenty of clubs will pay good dividends reward.

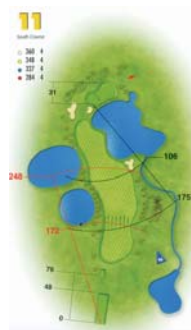


9th hole (Par 5. 455 metres)

Par 5. Very good thinker's hole. It's tempting to take on the corner, but the sensible play is to knock a 3rd down the wide side of fairway. On 2nd shot, you don't have to hit it as long as it suggests. On 3rd shot, stay away from bunkers if pin is cut close. A 2 putt par is a great result on this very good par 5.

10th hole (Par 4. 326 metres)

Par 4. Not a long hole but tricky, never the less. Once again you can



11th hole (Par 4. 327 metres)

Long par 4. With the new changes to this hole, it's fast becoming the feature hole of the south. It may look like a driver off the tee but a good fairway wood will put you in good shape to the corner and help you stay away from water on left side. A driver can run off the slope on the right of corner and into the hidden stream. 2nd shot, if you don't or can't take on the green bail out shot, is following fairway to left. Taking the green on, hit plenty of club and use the slope/ hill at the back.



12th hole (Par 3. 116 metres)

Par 3. Good maths are needed here, especially if there is a breeze. Select your club and put a good positive swing on the ball.



13th hole (Par 5. 475 metres)

Par 5. Out of bounds all down the left. But this should not really come into play. Bunkers, also run down left tee shot and 2nd shots should be played down right side of fairway. Be careful in your shot to the green. It plays very often longer than it looks.



14th hole (Par 4. 318 metres)

Par 4. Tricky hole this one. What looks like a bunker, all down the right side, is actually waste land. It's tempting to aim down left side and this is a good play. But be aware on the left side because you could be blocked out by trees. 2nd shot from waste land is sometimes a good mistake / miss. 2nd shot in this green is narrow, but very long from front to back, good knowledge of pin position is needed. The bunker on the left will not be a difficult shot to face, you should hit it.



15th hole (Par 4. 365 metres)

Stroke index 1 par 4. Very good hole, ideally you want to split the two bunkers you see from the tee. Left is a hazard and right tree lined. A good tee shot will give you very good chance of comfortable club to the green over the ravin. This shot is all carry over the ravin and the green entrance bunker.

(A 5 is a good number here).



16th hole (Par 4. 303 metres)

Par 4. A straight forward tee shot on this hole, keeps up the left side, this will be best line to take. 2nd shot from this side of fairway, you get a full and complete look at the green. Once again this shot is all carry over, the water looks for any wind. This can really hold the ball up and end up short.



17th hole (Par 3. 149 metres)

Par 3. Excellent hole. Bunkers surround this hole. The front and side bunkers should not pose too many problems but in the back bunker you should hit, it leaves you a tricky one down hill.

A great hole to play. Do your maths and once again put a good positive swing on the ball (and believe!).



18th hole (Par 5. 415 metres)

Par 5. A great finishing hole to finish any round of golf anywhere in the world. No matter how your game is going. Tee shot, water, bunker left, water right, a tee shot missing the bunker on left, leaves you the chance to take on the green.

Think about this option. Bunkers left, right, back, front ravin and a narrow green. A lay up may give you a better chance of birdie than you think. However hitting one of the side bunkers is a good miss.

Conditions of Competition

The following Conditions of Competition have been approved by the Executive and Championship Committees of the European Golf Association and shall apply, with any additions or amendments as published at the golf course, to all European Team Championships under Rule 33-1. The full version of the Conditions will be posted at the venue and is available at www.ega-golf.ch. All references refer to the current edition of the Rules of Golf as published by R&A Rules Limited.

1. GENERAL

1.1 Eligibility of Teams

Teams are nominated by European Golf Association (EGA) member national golf authorities.

If the number of entries should exceed the maximum (20), the Committee shall decide which teams will be invited to participate based on past participation, past results or both until a Challenge Trophy is officially introduced.

1.2 Eligibility of Players

All players nominated to teams by their national golf authority must be:

- a) amateur golfers in accordance with the Rules of Amateur Status as approved by R&A Rules Limited;
 - b) citizens of the country represented. Players with dual citizenship may only represent one country per year;
 - c) playing with a handicap of 9.0 or better.
- Penalty for Breach of Condition: Disqualification of player.

1.3 Format

A maximum of 20 teams shall be eligible to participate and each shall comprise six players.

The Championship will be played in accordance with the Rules of Golf as approved by R&A Rules Limited and the Local Rules as approved by the Championship Committee in two stages.

1.3.1 Stroke Play

There shall be two rounds of 18 holes stroke play on Days 1 and 2 to decide the draw for the match play, which commences on Day 3.

a) Order of Play

Team captains will determine the order of play within their teams for Days 1 and 2 using an official order of play form. If the order of play form is not submitted:

- i. For Day 1, by 17h00 on the day preceding the Championship, the order of play will be determined alphabetically by surname.
- ii. For Day 2, by 17h00 on Day 1, the order of play will be the same as for Day 1.

b) Scoring

The lowest five scores from each team's six players will count each day. The aggregate of the five lowest stroke play scores from play on Days 1 and 2 will constitute each team's score for determining the match play stage seeded draw.

c) Decision of Ties

A tie for any place in the match play order shall be decided using the lowest total of the two non-counting scores. If a tie still exists, the sum of the two lowest scores, one from each day, shall be used. Then, for further ties, the sum of the two second lowest scores, the third lowest scores, the fourth lowest scores and, finally, the sum of the two fifth lowest scores, one from each day, shall be used. Any further tie will be decided based on the final

stipulated 18, 9, 6, 3 holes or last hole, in that order, of the best score from each of the tied teams.

d) Substitutes

If a substitute is required, the Committee must be notified, at the latest, 20 minutes before the first tee time of Day 1. After this deadline, the team must remain with the same players for the entire Championship. A substitute is permitted for any reason, but may not participate in the practice rounds until she has been officially substituted for a team member with permission from the Committee. A breach of this Condition may result in the substitute not being permitted to compete.

e) Absentee Player

In the event that a registered team member cannot participate in a stipulated stroke play round, the team's five scores will count. In the case of a decision of ties, the team with the absentee player shall finish last. If more than one player is absent, the team shall automatically assume last place in the match play draw. The remaining players shall be permitted to play their stroke play rounds, which the committee may use to determine match play seeding when more than one team have two or more absentee players.

1.3.2 Match Play

The stroke play will determine a seeded order for the match play. A maximum of 20 teams will be divided into a first flight of eight teams: 1 vs. 8; 2 vs. 7; 4 vs. 5 and 3 vs. 6, second flight of eight teams: 10 vs. 15; 14 vs. 11; 12 vs. 13 and 9 vs. 16 and a third flight of four teams who will play a round-robin with the team qualifying 17th playing the teams qualifying 20th, 19th and 18th on Days 3, 4 and 5 respectively.

The results of the round robin will be determined based on points accumulated, with 1 point awarded for a win. In the event of a tie, the final positions will be decided by number of individual matches won and then, if necessary, by number of holes won (see 1.3.2 (e) Exception).

If there are fewer than 20 teams, the structure of the draw will change according to a standardised EGA format.

Irrespective of the number of teams entered, only teams in contention for a medal will play a match format of two foursomes and five singles. All other teams will play a one foursome and four singles match format.

a) Order of Play

On the eve of each match, team captains must provide the Committee with the order of play, using the official order of play form, for the foursomes and singles matches:

- i. for Day 3 matches, no later than 30 minutes after the completion of the second round of stroke play.
 - ii. for Day 4 and 5 matches, no later than 30 minutes after the completion of their team's flight the previous Day.
- Failure to submit the official order of play form on time will result in the order of play being determined alphabetically by surname.

b) Substitutes: Medal-Contention Matches

Foursomes - the Committee must be notified of a substitution no later than 20 minutes prior to the team's first foursomes tee time. The substitute will take the position of the player she substitutes.

Singles - the Committee must be notified of a substitution no later than 20 minutes prior to the team's first singles tee time. The substitute will take the last position in the team's order of play. The other team players maintain their respective order, with those positioned below the replaced player moving forward one position.

c) Substitutes: Non-Medal Contention Matches

Although no substitutes will be available, changes in the order of play are not permitted.

Penalty for Breach of Condition 1.3.2 (b) and (c): Disqualification of all players out of the pre-stated order of play.

d) Halved Match

In the event of a halved match in any round, players shall continue to play until a player wins a hole, when the match will be considered won.

Exception: Condition 1.3.2 (e).

e) Concession of Matches

When a final team match result is already decided, an individual match may be halved if all participants in that match agree.

Note: After 18 holes or any extra hole(s), if the players in an individual match remain all square and the final result of the team match has been decided, the match in question will be halved. Exception: If the matches are in a flight of three competing nations or in the third flight, players must play until there is a winner, including the playing of extra holes if necessary.

f) Absentee Players

In the event that a registered team member cannot participate in a stipulated match play round, that player's match shall be forfeited at a position within the order of play determined by the captain. If the captain has not submitted an order of play, the final singles match will be forfeited. Up to two singles games may be forfeited owing to player absence by any one team. Foursomes matches must not be forfeited in favour of singles matches. If fewer than four players are available to represent a team, that team must forfeit its match.

1.4 Practice

A player who is competing in the championship will not be allowed to practice on the championship course for a period of thirty days before the first official practice day, unless he is a member of the golf club at which the championship is being played. Only registered team players will be permitted to practice during the official practice rounds and in official practice areas.

See Section 1.3 1(d) for information on practice for substitutes.

1.5 Advice (Note to Rule 8-1)

Each team may appoint a "Team Advisor" who may give advice to members of that team from either:

- a) a Team Captain, who must be an amateur golfer in accordance with the Rules of Amateur Status as approved by R&A Rules Limited; or
 - b) another person who may or may not be a professional golfer. If appointed, a Team Advisor must be identified to the Committee prior to the start of the Championship.
- Note: A Team Captain may be named in addition to a Team Advisor, but then, only the Team Advisor may offer advice. Please refer to 1.7 (a) for caddying permissions.

1.6 Driving Clubs / Conforming Golf Balls / Time of Starting

The specimen conditions in the Rules of Golf are in effect regarding Conforming Driver Heads and Golf Balls (page 141) and Time of Starting (page 143).

1.7 Caddies / Transportation / Electric Golf Trolleys

a) No caddies are permitted except for fellow team members.

a) Players must not ride on any form of transport during a stipulated round unless authorised by the Committee.

b) Electric golf trolleys are only permitted if there is sufficient number to be equally distributed among the teams.

Penalty for Breach of Condition: Match Play - At the conclusion of the hole at which the breach is discovered, the state of the match must be adjusted by deducting one hole for each hole at which a breach occurred; maximum deduction per round: two holes.

Stroke Play - Two strokes for each hole at which any breach occurred; maximum penalty per round: four strokes.

Match or stroke play - In the event of a breach between the play of two holes, the penalty applies to the next hole.

For 1.7 a): A player having a caddie in breach of this Condition must immediately upon discovery that a breach has occurred ensure that he conforms to this Condition for the remainder of the stipulated round. Otherwise, the player is disqualified.

For 1.7 b) and c): Use of any unauthorised form of transportation or an electric golf trolley shall be discontinued immediately upon discovery that a breach has occurred. Otherwise, the player is disqualified.

1.8 Pace of Play

In the absence of mitigating circumstances, a group is liable to be timed if it is in excess of the time allowed and, in the case of second or subsequent groups, out of position.

From the commencement of timing, if any player exceeds 50 seconds on a first to play approach shot (including a Par 3 tee shot), chip or putt, or 40 seconds if it is a tee shot or second or third to play shot, he is deemed to have a "bad time".

The time allowed to play each hole and stipulated round will be determined by the Committee and published on the official notice board. Out of position is defined as being more than the starting interval behind the group in front in the absence of mitigating circumstances.

A player whose group is timed will have a bad time carried forward in the round even if the group subsequently arrives back in position or within time.

Penalty for Breach of Condition:

One bad time Verbal warning from official;

Two bad times One stroke penalty; Loss of hole;

Three bad times Two stroke penalty; Final warning;

Four bad times Disqualification.

1.9 Suspension of Play

A minimum of 18 holes stroke play must be completed by all players in order to attain a Championship result.

1.10 Suspension of Play due to a Dangerous Situation (Note to Rule 6-8b)

The specimen condition in the Rules of Golf is in effect (page 144).

Note: A suspension of play for a dangerous situation will be signalled by a **prolonged note of a horn**. All other suspensions will be signalled by **three consecutive short notes** of a horn repeated. In either case, resumption of play will be signalled by **two short notes** of a horn repeated.

1.11 Anti-Doping

Players shall not make use of any drug to enhance their performance. In this respect, the attention of players is drawn to the prescribed list of prohibited drugs issued by the host country's national sports council. Any player infringing this Condition or refusing to take a test may be disqualified.



1.12 Gender Policy

Any player not complying with EGA Gender Policy guidelines or refusing measures for gender determination as recommended by the host country's national sports council will be disqualified.

1.1 Use of Electronic Devices

See Decision 14-3/16.

1.13 Return of Scorecards

Following each of the stroke play rounds on Days 1 and 2, players must return their scorecards to an area designated by the Committee as the "Scoring or Recording Area" in accordance with Rule 6-6b. The scorecard is considered returned when the player has left the Scoring or Recording Area.

1.14 Results of the Competition / Competition Closed

When the final results are placed on the official notice board, the results of the Championship shall be deemed to have been officially announced. Any dispute or doubtful point on the Rules must be referred to the Committee before the conclusion of play on the final day and not later than 15 minutes after play concludes on the preceding days.

1.15 Disqualification

A penalty of disqualification for a breach of the Rules or the Conditions of Competition applies only to the round in which the breach occurred unless otherwise determined by the Committee. A disqualified team will assume last place in the championship.

2. COMMITTEE

2.1 Composition of Authority

The EGA Championship Committee members present are responsible for the sporting aspects of the Championship and reserve the right to amend the Championship Conditions. The Committee may appoint a Referee whose decision on the Rules of Golf will be final.

2.2 Competition Cancelled or Altered

The Committee reserves the right to reduce or cancel any stipulated round, suspend or postpone play, cancel the competition or come to an equitable decision to achieve a result.

3. ENTRIES

3.1 Entry Form

Entries will only be accepted on the official entry form and must be received at the EGA office with full entry fee payment before the closing date. Partially completed or late entries will not be accepted. A team's entry form will not be considered to have been officially received until the country's name has been posted on www.ega-golf.ch.

3.2 Payment

No team may compete in the Championship until the entrance and team fees have been paid.

3.3 Refunds Following Withdrawal

Entrance fees will only be refunded following withdrawal if notice is received no later than 21 days before Day 1 of the Championship, unless there is a valid reason that is acceptable to the EGA.

4. PRIZES

4.1 Title and Awards

The winning team of the Championship shall be the European Ladies' Amateur Team Champion for a period of one year. The Championship Trophy shall be held by the winners' national golf authority, which will be responsible for the cost of engraving, insuring and maintaining the Trophy and should return it, before the next Championship, to an address named by the EGA Secretary. The EGA will present medals to the members of the winning team and to the members of the second and third placed teams. Professional golfers nominated as Team Advisors may receive a medal in the absence of a non-playing amateur Team Captain. The EGA will present the host club with a memento. The host country will present all participants with a memento.

5. REGISTRATION

5.1 Registration Deadline

Team players' names should be submitted to the hosting national golf authority no later than 10 days prior to the first official practice round. Participating teams must register as soon as possible following their arrival at the championship venue. Team captains may register players' names on behalf of their team.

6. DISCLAIMER

All nominated team players agree that there are certain risks inherent in the game of golf and accept personal and sole liability for all such risks.

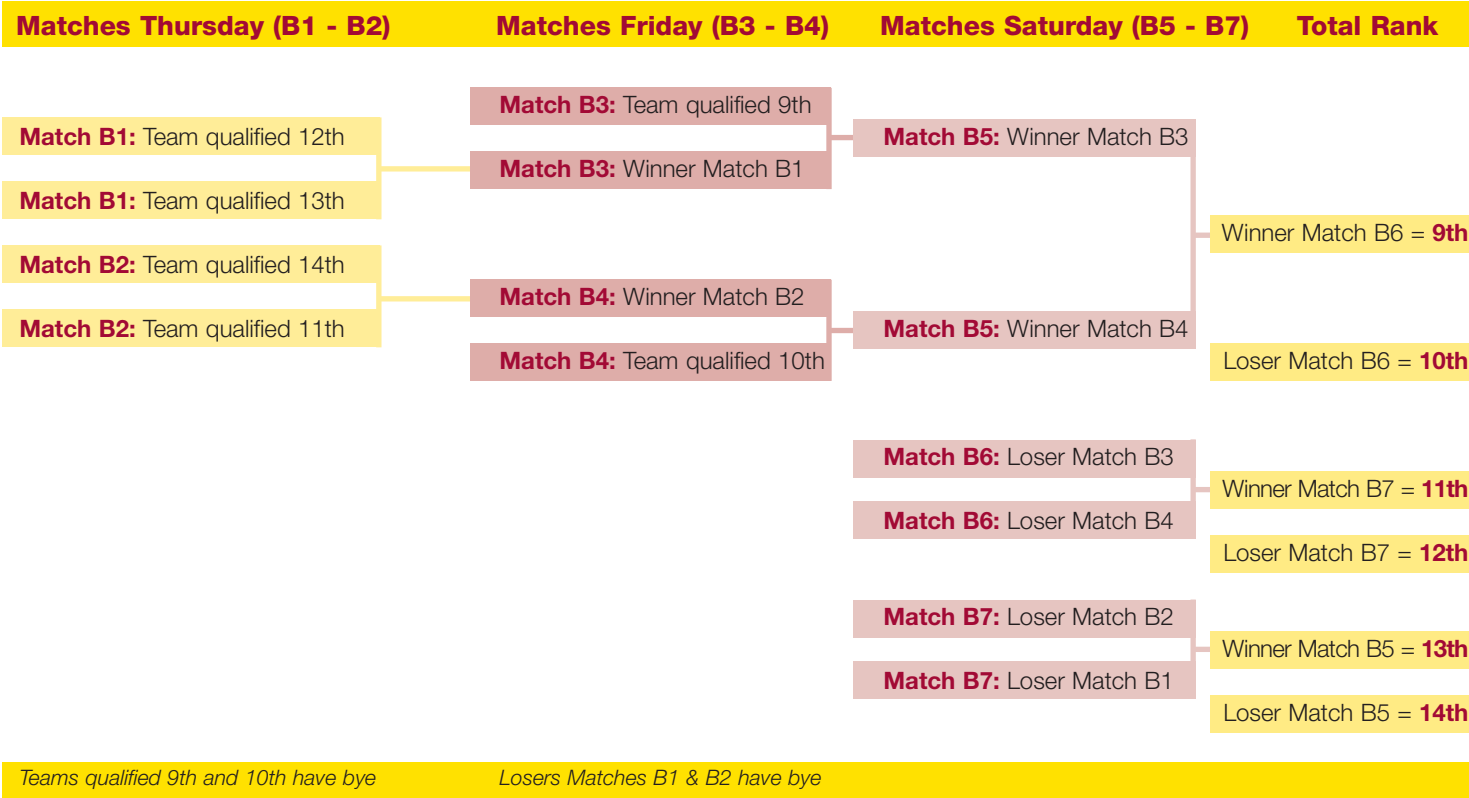

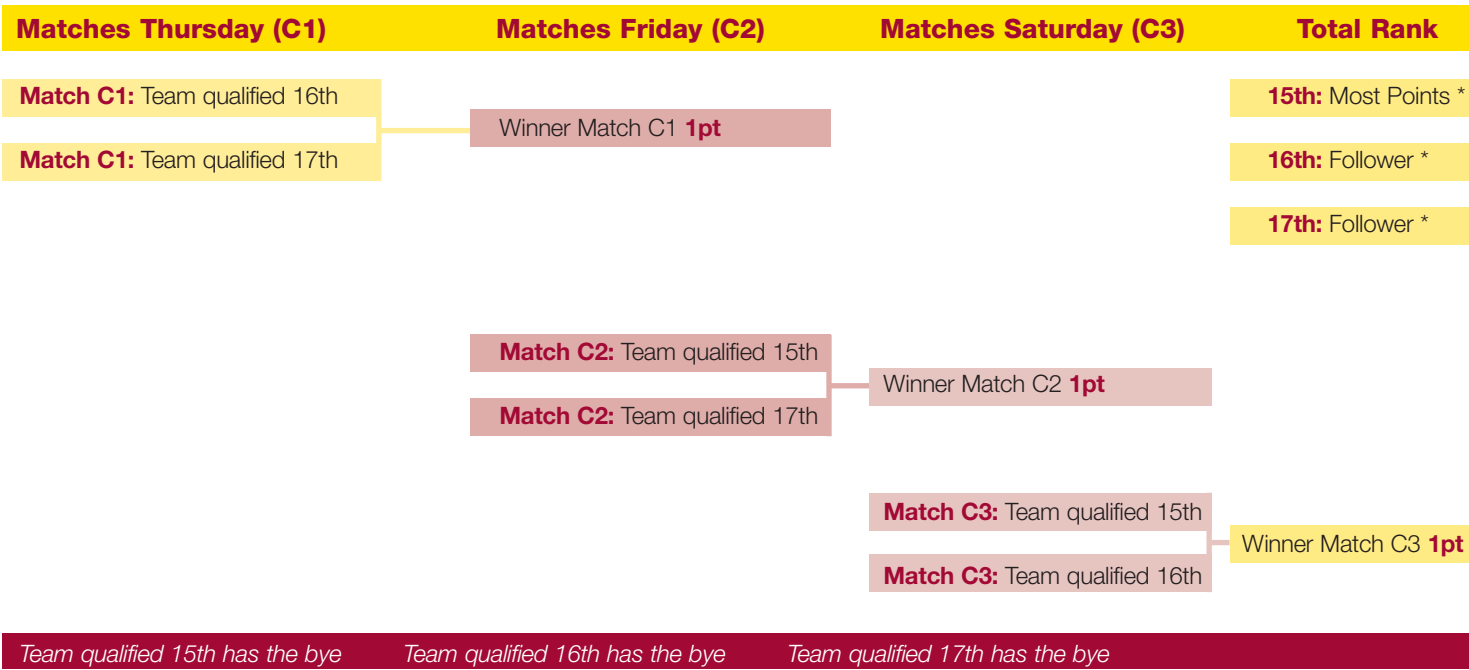
Matches Flight A; Teams Qualified 1 - 8 after Stroke Play

THIRD FLIGHT (3 teams) - 17 countries participating - ROUND ROBIN

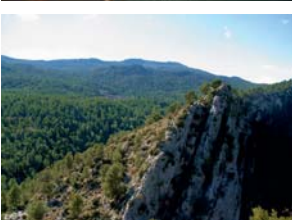
