History

The Campo de Golf del Parador de El Saler, in the province of Valencia, one of the most highly regarded courses in Continental Europe, will stage the 25th edition of the European Girls' Team Championship U18, one of the benchmarks of the continental schedule, from July 9-13 2019.

Spain will play host to the European Girls' Team Championship U18 for the second time, having held the second edition of the tournament at Real Club de Campo de Málaga in 1993. The championship was created in 1991 as a biennial event up to 1999, when it became annual.

The fact that many LET and even LPGA Tour stars have represented their countries as amateurs along the 24 previous editions of the European Girls' Team Championship speaks volumes about the significance of the event.

Sweden and Spain top the record book

Spain has brought home the gold medal seven times (1991, 1993, 1997, 2001, 2002, 2003, 2015). The Spaniards add to their seven gold medals, three silver (2006, 2012, 2018) and seven bronze medals (1995, 2004, 2009, 2010, 2011, 2013, 2016), for an impressive total of seventeen medals out of a possible twenty four. This makes Spain the most awarded participant in the European Girls' Team Championship.

Sweden leads the roll of honour with eight victories (1995, 2000, 2004, 2007, 2008, 2012, 2013, 2017).

France has won three times (2010, 2011, 2014), Germany twice (1999, 2006), Italy twice (2016, 2018), England once (2005) and Ireland once (2009).

Last edition

Italy won the European Girls' Team Championship at Forsgardens Golfklubb, Sweden. The Italians topped the stroke play qualifying after the first two days on -3, and were the only team to finish under par. Allessia Nobilio, who shot a seven-under-par 65 on day two, tied for the lowest aggregate individual score with the Czech Republic's Sarah Hricikova.

Two other Italian players finished in the top-six of the stroke play, Emilie Alba Paltrinieri on three-under-par, and Virginia Bossi on one-under-par.

The number-one seeds defeated the Netherlands and the Czech Republic in the quarter and semi-finals to set up a final with Spain. They won both of the morning foursomes, meaning just two wins from the afternoon singles would be enough to secure the title. Anna Zanusso won the first afternoon match meaning Catarina Don's 3&1 win in the third match of the afternoon guaranteed Italy would lift the trophy for the second time in three years.





The Course

El Saler, a top-class venue

The Campo de Golf del Parador de El Saler, one of the most highly regarded courses in Continental Europe, will stage the 25th edition of the European Girls' Team Championship U18, one of the benchmarks of the continental schedule.

Since its inauguration in June 1968, the El Saler course has hosted many top-tier golf tournaments, both professional and amateur, including four editions of the Open de España. This European Tour event was held here in 1984, 1989, 2001 and 2013. Germany's Bernhard Langer lifted the trophy in the first two editions played at El Saler, followed by Sweden's Robert Karlsson in 2001 and Frenchman Raphael Jacquelin in 2013.

The Seve Trophy was staged at El Saler in 2003, and previously the 1996 Turespaña Masters and the 1993 Open del Mediterráneo were also held at the prestigious Valencia layout.

A masterpiece by Javier Arana

The Campo de Golf del Parador de El Saler, built by the internationally recognized "architect of Spanish golf" Javier Arana, comprises two very distinct sets of holes: forest holes that run between pine trees and links holes by the Mediterranean Sea.

Arana treated the landscape with the utmost respect and adapted his design to the topography of the area. He maintained the original native vegetation and allowed the coastal dunes to be part of the course's identity. Some of the 95 bunkers that defend the course are just natural dunes that come into play.

Besides the generous fairways and huge, testing greens, the players will have to face two classical features of El Saler: strong winds and the much feared "cat's claw". This pale stonecrop, a protected species, has been the nightmare of many. Arana's beautiful and classical design never fails to provide a true test of golf.

PARADOR EL SALER GOLF - Hole by hole (1-6)



Hole 1 - Par 4 - 391m

Hole slightly dog-legged to the left and right, it will be very difficult to reach the green with the second shot if the driver is placed too much to the right side. The green is well guarded by bunkers and pine trees.

Hole 2 - Par 4 - 344m

Bunkers in both sides of the fairway make the driver difficult. The second shot must be very accurate, as the sloping green is a very difficult one.

Hole 3 - Par 5 - 486m

The ideal drive has to be long carry over the left hand side trees, to give the player any chance of getting on the green in two. The green is guarded by bunkers on both sides and trees.

Hole 4 - Par 3 - 173m

A two platforms green, surrounded by trees and protected by three bunkers.

Hole 5 - Par 5 - 471m

A driver off-line will either catch two bunkers on the right side or a thick rough on the left. The green has not special difficulties and is guarded by four bunkers.

Hole 6 - Par 4 - 404m

It is a very difficult hole, dog-legged to the left. The drive needs to be long and accurate, to reach the green with the second shot, as the sloping fairway may punish even a good drive.

PARADOR EL SALER GOLF - Hole by hole (7-12)



Hole 7 - Par 4 - 327m
It is an easy par four with two bunkers on the left side of the fairway. The slope in the entrance of the green is the only difficulty of the hole.

Hole 8 - Par 4 - 328m
It is a real links hole, with an out of bounds on the left hand side, making very tough trying the driver. The green is very difficult, with two platforms and a big slope between them.

Hole 9 - Par 3 - 143m
The only difficulty is and out of bounds on the right hand side. The plateau green is guarded by three bunkers.

Hole 10 - Par 4 - 365m
The drive must avoid the right of the fairway, where a big pine tree makes impossible the second shot to a wide green with trees on the left and bunkers on the right.

Hole 11 - Par 5 - 519m
The longest hole, with the wind from the sea making it even longer. The fairway is wide and has not special difficulties. The approach to the green is covered by a bunker in front and a pine on the left.

Hole 12 - Par 3 - 181m
The big green makes the placing of the pin decisive. There are bunkers on either side of the green.

PARADOR EL SALER GOLF - Hole by hole (13-18)



Hole 13 - Par 4 - 318m
The shortest par 4 on the course, and the easler on the inward half. The green is surrounded by trees and one bunker on the left, but has not special difficulties.

Hole 14 - Par 4 - 378m
Requires a drive over the bunker on the right, leaving a medium ron shot to the sloping green.

Hole 15 - Par 5 - 516m
Dog-leg to the right, with a wide treelined fairway, making very difficult to recover from the rough. The green, guarded by bunkers and trees, is an easy one.

Hole 16 - Par 4 - 390m
An out of bounds along the left side of the fairway makes the drive difficult. The green, with two platforms, has three bunkers covering the approach.

Hole 17 - Par 3 - 190m
A decisive hole. The green is guarded by five bunkers, and the thick rough makes impossible to recover.

Hole 18 - Par 4 - 426m
A difficult par 4, dog-legged to the left, along the sea, usually with strong winds. There is an out of bounds on the left, and bunkers on the right. The two platforms green is the widest of the course.

Conditions of competition

1. GENERAL

1.1 Eligibility of Teams

Teams are nominated by European Golf Association (EGA) Member National Golf Authorities. If the number of entries should exceed the maximum (20), the Committee shall decide which teams will be invited to participate based on past participation, past results or both until a Division 2 is officially introduced.

1.2 Eligibility of Players

All players nominated to teams by their national golf authority must be female and:

- a) amateur golfers in accordance with the Rules of Amateur Status as approved by R&A Rules Limited;
- b) citizens of the country represented. Players with dual citizenship may only represent one country per year;
- c) playing with a handicap of 14.0 or better;
- d) under the age of 18 years at 0.00 hours on 1 January, the year of the championship.

Penalty for Breach of Eligibility Term: disqualification of player.

1.3 Format

A maximum of 20 teams shall be eligible to participate and each shall comprise six players.

The Championship comprises two stages played in accordance with the 2019 Rules of Golf as approved by R&A Rules Limited, the EGA Generic Terms of Competition and Regulations, EGA Hard Card and the Local Rules as approved by the Championship Committee at the championship.

1.3.1 Stage 1 - Stroke Play

There shall be two rounds of 18 holes stroke play on Days 1 and 2 to decide the seeded draw for the match play, which commences on Day 3.

a) Order of Play

Team Captains will determine the order of play within their teams for Days 1 and 2 using the official order of play form. If the order of play form is not submitted to the Committee:

- I. for Day 1, by 17h00 on the day preceding the Championship, the order of play will be determined alphabetically by surname;
- II. for Day 2, by 17h00 on Day 1, the order of play will be the same as for Day 1.

b) Scoring

The lowest five scores from each team's six players will count each day. The aggregate of the five lowest stroke play scores from play on Days 1 and 2 will constitute each team's score.

c) Decision of Ties

A tie for any place in the match play order shall be decided using the lowest total of the two non-counting scores. If a tie still exists, the sum of the two lowest scores, one from each day, shall be used. For further ties, the sum of the two second lowest scores, the third

lowest scores, the fourth lowest scores and, finally, the sum of the two fifth lowest scores, one from each day, shall be used. Any further tie will be decided based on the final stipulated 18, 9, 6, 3 holes or last hole of the best score from each of the tied teams.

d) Substitutes

If a substitute player is required, the Committee must be notified, at the latest, 30 minutes before the first tee time of Day 1. After this deadline, the team must remain with the same players for the entire Championship. A substitute player is permitted for any reason, but may not participate in the practice rounds until she has been officially substituted for a team member with permission from the Committee. A breach of this Term may result in the substitute player not being permitted to compete.

e) Absentee Player

In the event that a registered team member cannot participate in a stroke play round, the team's five scores will count. In the case of a decision of ties, the team with the absentee player shall finish last. If more than one player is absent, the team shall automatically assume last place in the match play draw. The remaining players shall be permitted to play their stroke play rounds, which the committee may use to determine match play seeding when more than one team has two or more absentee players.

1.3.2 Stage 2 - Match Play

Irrespective of the number of teams entered, only teams in contention for a medal will play a match format of two foursomes and five singles. All other teams will play a one foursome and four singles match format.

The stroke play will determine a seeded order for the match play. A maximum of 20 teams will be divided into a first flight of eight teams: 1 vs 8; 2 vs 7; 3 vs 6, and 4 vs 5, second flight of eight teams: 9 vs 16; 10 vs 15; 11 vs 14; and 12 vs 13 and a third flight of four teams who will play a round-robin with the team qualifying 17th playing the teams qualifying 20th, 19th and 18th on Days 3, 4 and 5 respectively.

If there are fewer than 20 teams, the seeded draw will change according to a standardised EGA format.

A win in either a foursomes or singles match shall return one point, a tied match, half a point (see 1.3.2 (d)) and a loss, zero points to the team's score. The results of the round robin will be determined based on points accumulated, with one point awarded for a win, half a point for a half, and zero for a loss. In the event of a tie, the final positions will be decided by the number of individual matches won and, if necessary, by the number of holes won (see 1.3.2 (e) Exception).

Conditions of competition

a) Order of Play

I. Medal-Contention Matches

Team Captains must provide the Committee with the order of play, using the official order of play form, for the foursomes and singles matches:

- i. for the foursomes, on the eve of the match, no later than 30 minutes after the completion of the second round of stroke play for day 3; and for days 4 & 5 foursomes, no later than 30 minutes after the completion of their team's flight.
- ii. for the singles, on the day of the match, no later than 30 minutes after the team's last foursomes match completes the first nine holes.

II. Non Medal-Contention Matches

On the eve of each match, Team Captains must provide the Committee with the order of play, using the official order of play form, for the foursomes and singles matches:

- i. for Day 3 matches, no later than 30 minutes after the completion of the second round of stroke play;
- ii. for Day 4 and 5 matches, no later than 30 minutes after the completion of their team's flight the previous Day.

Failure to submit the official order of play form on time will result in the order of play being determined alphabetically by surname.

Once the official deadline to submit the order of play form has expired, changes in the order of play are not permitted. **Exception:** substitute Term 1.3.2 (b).

Penalty for Breach of Term 1.3.2 (a): disqualification of all players out of the prestated order of play.

b) Substitutes

For Medal-Contention foursomes only, substitutions may be made only for reasons of illness, injury or exceptional grounds acceptable to the Committee. The Committee must be notified of a substitution no later than 30 minutes prior to the team's first foursomes tee time. The substitute will take the position of the player she substitutes.

A player substituted from the foursomes is not permitted to be entered in the singles' draw on the same day.

Substitutions are not permitted for MedalContention singles, unless accepted by the Committee under exceptional circumstances.

c) Tied Match

In the event of a match being all square after 18 holes in any round, players shall continue to play until one wins a hole, when the match will be considered won. **Exception:** Term 1.3.2 (d).

d) Concession of Matches

When a final team match result is already decided, an individual match may be tied if all participants in that match agree.

Note: after 18 holes or any extra hole(s), if the players in an individual match remain all square and the final result of the team match has been decided, the match in question will be tied.

Exception: if the matches within a flight are to be played as a round robin, players must play until the end of the round which will not be extended into extra holes.

e) Absentee Players

In the event that one (several) registered team member(s) cannot participate in a stipulated match play round, matches shall be forfeited at a position within the order of play according to the following principles.

- I. Foursome matches must not be forfeited and must always be played.
Exception: in a medal-contention match, if a team has three absentee players, one foursome will be forfeited.

II. Non-Medal Contention Matches

- i. If the "withdrawal" occurs before the official deadline to submit the order of play form has expired, the Team Captain will return the order of play form with the absentee player placed in the position of his or her choice in the singles and the match will be forfeited.
- ii. If the "withdrawal" occurs after the official deadline to submit the order of play form has expired,
 - if the absentee player is listed to play in the singles: his match shall be forfeited,
 - if the absentee player is listed to play in the foursome, he will be replaced by one of the players listed to play in the singles. The replacement will be determined by lot and his single match shall be forfeited.

If fewer than four players are available to represent a team, that team must forfeit its match.

III. Medal Contention Matches

- i. If the "withdrawal" occurs before the official deadline to submit the order of play form has expired, the Team Captain will return the order of play form with the absentee player(s) placed in the position(s) of his or her choice and the match(es) shall be forfeited.
- ii. If the "withdrawal" occurs after the official deadline to submit the order of play form has expired, the absentee player(s) match(es) shall be forfeited. **Exception:** Term 1.3.2 (b).

If fewer than three players are available to represent a team, that team must forfeit its match.

Conditions of competition

Note to I, II and III: In the event that opposing teams would each have one or more absentee players, then these players would be deemed to have been paired together and to have tied their match. Should this require the re pairing of matches, the player(s) in the match(es) impacted higher in the order of play will descend to play the player(s) in the other impacted match(es). A team match tied result would be decided by stroke play qualification position.

1.4 Practice

A team player, team captain or advice giver will not be allowed to practice on the championship course for a period of fifteen days prior to the first official practice day, unless he or she is a member of the golf club at which the championship is being played.
Only registered team players will be permitted to practice during the official practice rounds and in official practice areas.
See Section 1.3.1 (d) for information on practice for substitutes.

1.5 Team Captain and Advice (Rule 24)

a) Team Captain (Rule 24.3)

Each team may name a Team Captain who must be an amateur golfer in accordance with the Rules of Amateur Status as approved by R&A Rules Limited.
Penalty for Breach of Local Rule: disqualification of Team.

b) Advice (Rule 24.4)

Two advice givers may be named by each team from whom players in the team may ask and receive advice. The first must be the Team Captain (see 1.5.a)) and the second may or may not be a professional golfer.
The advice givers must be identified to the Committee prior to the start of the Championship.
The advice givers must not walk on the putting green when the ball of a team player is on the putting green.
Penalty for Breach of Local Rule: general penalty.

1.6 Caddies / Electric Trolleys

- a)** Rule 10.3a is modified in this way: a player must not have a caddie other than a fellow team player during the round.
- b)** During a round, a player or caddie must not use an electric golf trolley.
Penalty for Breach of Local Rule: the player gets the general penalty for each hole during which she is in breach of the local rule. If the breach happens between two holes, the player gets the general penalty for the next hole.

1.7 Disqualification

A penalty of disqualification for a breach of the Rules or the Terms of Competition applies only to the round in which the breach occurred unless otherwise determined by the Committee.
A disqualified team will assume last place in the Championship.

2. PRIZES

2.1 Title and Awards

The winning team of the Championship shall be the European Girls' Team Champion for a period of one year. The Championship Trophy shall be held by the winners' National Golf Authority, who will be responsible for the cost of engraving, insuring and maintaining the Trophy and returning it, before the next Championship, to an address named by the EGA Secretary. The EGA will present medals to the members of the winning team and to the members of the second and third placed teams. Professional golfers nominated as advice givers may receive a medal in the absence of a non-playing amateur team captain.
The EGA will present the host club with a memento.
The host country will present all participants with a memento.
